# A Catholic Catechesis: Biblical Apologetics

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# **SYLLABUS**

## COURSE DESCRIPTION

This on-line class will serve as a survey of the origin and development of Roman Catholic Christianity from the period of the apostolic church, through the post apostolic church and into the conciliar movement. Principal attention will be paid to the biblical basis of both doctrine and dogma as well as the role of paradosis, i.e., handing-on the truth, in the history of the Church. Particular attention will also be made to the hierarchical founding and succession of leadership throughout the centuries. The role of the new Catholic Catechism in the contemporary church will be studied.

### **COURSE PURPOSE**

The purpose of this course is to orient students to the biblical origins of the Roman Catholic Church, its history, its organization, its doctrinal development, and Its sacramental and devotional life. The course will take a strong scriptural position, utilizing the classical apologetical or reasoned approach of proof. Students wishing to know the teachings of the Catholic Church from its own believers will find this an exhilarating classroom experience.

### PERSONAL NOTE TO STUDENTS

Some time in the 1980s, while founding and teaching at an Evangelical university, I was amazed that so many other Christians did not know or understand where I, as a Catholic, was coming from and why I would be willing to teach at an evangelical university. As more and more students and teaching colleagues would ask questions of me about my Catholicism, I started collecting the questions and issues that were brought up. It came to a point I knew that I wanted to write a response to the questions of others in an orderly and progressive way. Then I realized that I had just defined what the word "apologetic" meant. Hence the origin of the eBook around which this class is built. For years, a Catholic colleague of mine, Paul Flanagan, and I started teaching the class wherever we were welcome, including at the Evangelical university itself. We used acetates to structure the content and present the many scriptures to which we were going to refer. That eventually gave way to the new technology, the computer and the software PowerPoint. This class and its content has become a passion of mine and now occupies my retirement years entirely. Together, again, with Paul, this Web site has been developed and it lies ready for you to use and learn. May you find answers to all your questions about the Catholic Church.

# **COURSE OBJECTIVES**

- A. To present the biblical basis for the origin and development of the Roman Catholic Church.
- B. To present the development of the canon of Scripture and evolution of biblical teaching in the Church.
- C. To understand the role of paradosis/tradition in the oral transmission of revelation.
- D. To study the Council of Jerusalem (Acts 15) and its role in the origin and development of doctrine in the conciliar movement in the Church.
- E. The understand the revelation, doctrinal development and practice of a sacramental life in the history of the Church until Vatican Council II.
- F. To study the role of the Holy Spirit as teaching authority in the Church.
- G. To study the revelation and development of hierarchical authority in the Church.
- H. To understand the hierarchy of truth in the Church as well as the role of private devotion and personal growth in holiness in the Church.

# **PREREQUISITES**

An openness to the understanding of the faith and practice of Roman Catholicism with an interest in the history of an ancient church is all that is necessary to take this course.
